Discolored Water

Discolored/rusty water can happen for several different reasons; water main breaks, hydrant flushing, firefighting or gate valve exercising to name a few.

Here are some basic instructions on how to clear the discolored water from your home:

- Check with the District for the cause of the discolored water by either checking our website, our facebook page or by calling our office.
- ♦ Try not to draw the sediment into your residence by limiting your water use while any work is being done.
- Once the work is complete, wait for approximately a half hour. Then run the water at an outside spigot. If it does not clear in five to ten minutes, shut the water off and wait an additional 45 minutes to 1 hour and try again.
- If hot water was used when you had rusty water, you may want to flush the hot water tank and lines as well. Most hot water tanks have a tap on the bottom to which a garden hose can be attached. Run it until it becomes clear. 5 minutes is about average.
- ♦ A bathroom faucet uses an average of 5.5 gallons of water per minute. Therefore, running your tub faucet for 10 minutes would cost approximately \$0.37 cents.
